




EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: THE 2015 ECONOMIC IMPACT OF ARKANSAS VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers in Arkansas provided an estimated total of 123,396,424 hours of labor in 2015, for an estimated economic contribution of \$2,361,807,556. This figure is based upon an extrapolation from a total of 10,551,434 reported hours from a representative sample of 864 nonprofit organizations, school districts, state agencies, local governments, and other organizations across the state.

The annual survey was first published in 1983 by the Department of Human Services, Division of Community Service & Nonprofit Support in collaboration with the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR). The 2015 survey and report were prepared by Dr. Vickie Edwards of Troy University and the UALR Survey Research Center. This publication captures the findings for this year's study.

Volunteer labor allows nonprofits to operate more efficiently and make better use of their limited resources. This report illustrates the wide variety of tasks that Arkansas volunteers perform, and demonstrates that Arkansas has a vibrant nonprofit and volunteer community that contributes positively to community and economic development statewide.

WHAT VOLUNTEERS DO: AREA AGENCY ON AGING OF WEST CENTRAL ARKANSAS, INC.

The Senior Companion Program's mission is to keep seniors who live in their own homes living independent, meaningful, dignified lives. The program's goal is to assist seniors so they may remain in their homes and out of the nursing homes for as long as possible. The volunteers provide companionship, assist with grooming, help to prepare meals, do laundry, dishes, bedding, and light housekeeping. The volunteers also provide transportation to help clients get groceries, and pharmacies to get medications, doctors' appointments, hair appointments, and social outings. Additionally, the volunteers provide respite care to family care givers. The Senior Companion Program saves the state millions of dollars per year by providing services to keep the clients in their homes.

The volunteers are 55 and older, and most volunteers are in the low income range. The volunteers have to be in the 200% poverty guide lines in order to receive a stipend. However, we have a few volunteers that do not qualify for a stipend – they are reimbursed 35 cents per mile, as are the stipend paid volunteers.

WORK PERFORMED BY VOLUNTEERS

Different organizations have different needs, and volunteers serve in a variety of capacities. These activities might include preparing and serving meals, working at special events and festivals, help with filing and office work, tutoring and mentoring students, and much more. Figure 1 shows the number of organizations which use volunteers for these various purposes, and shows the variety of ways in which volunteers can contribute to their communities. Figures showing the percentage of organizations using different types of volunteers are also presented for each organizational category in the Reporting Organizations section of this report.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

The UALR Survey Research Center (SRC) conducted the multi-mode survey between January 28 and June 7, 2016. Volunteer, board and organizational information was collected from key personnel from 864 eligible organizations across the state of Arkansas. Organizational contact information was obtained from the Secretary of State's Office and multiple databases provided by the Department of Human Services, Division of Community Service & Nonprofit Support.

A total of 3,446 eligible organizations were contacted either by email, phone, or both and invited to participate in the study. All organizations with email addresses for key personnel were sent an email invitation to participate in the study with five follow-up email reminders over the 4-month period. In addition, a random sample of organizations with only phone contact information was formed and used in the phone phase of data collection. The SRC made up to eight attempts to contact each organization's representative. The SRC continued calling until a refusal was reached, the organization/representative was identified as non-eligible, or the interviewing period ended.


The overall response rates for the survey is 48% (RR3) for the phone phase and 20% (RR3) for the email phase. These rates represent the number of completed interviews expressed as a percentage of all eligible organizations in the samples.

ESTIMATION METHODOLOGY

Estimates for the total number of nonprofit organizations in Arkansas are of questionable accuracy, as recent changes in IRS reporting requirements have resulted in some organizations (many of them defunct) losing recognition as tax-exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the tax code, combined with the fact that religious congregations are not required to file for exempt status with the IRS. The Arkansas Secretary of State’s Office listed 8,489 incorporated not-for-profit organizations in the state as of September 2014; however, this list does not include any organizations operating under the auspices of a national or out-of-state parent organization. The Urban Institute’s National Center for Charitable Statistics (NCCS) provides the most reliable estimates for the total number of nonprofits in each state, and estimates a total of 11,968 nonprofit organizations (including religious congregations) were in operation within the state of Arkansas in 2014, 6,685 of which were considered public charities under section 501(c)(3) of the tax code.¹

The figures used for statistical weighting in estimating the total number of hours volunteered statewide were based upon 2010 Form 990 and 990-EZ returns for nonprofit organizations in Arkansas, with weights calculated for each NTEE major category. It should be noted, however, that the Form 990 data is limited to organizations that filed Form 990 or Form 990-EZ, and does not include organizations that filed Form 990-PF or were not required to file for the 2010 fiscal year. The responding organizations were proportionally representative of the distribution of nonprofit organizations statewide. Upon applying the statistical weighting multipliers to the reported volunteerism hours for each major category, the hour total was then extrapolated for a statewide estimate of total volunteerism based upon the 2014 NCCS estimate for the total number of public charities in Arkansas (6,685).

WHAT VOLUNTEERS DO: HABITAT FOR HUMANITY OF SALINE COUNTY

Our volunteers are engaged in a wide range of activities that support our Mission. We have a group called our "Tuesday Crew" who work on our Construction site building homes every Tuesday. ReStore Volunteers do a wide range of things such as sorting items, pricing items, organizing the store, working the check-out, helping customers out to their cars with items purchased and taking in donation items. The funds from our Restore fund our homes that are being built so having Volunteer's to do so much there allows us to keep building decent and affordable homes. Volunteers who like a quieter setting come in and help with clerical office work. We also have a large number of Volunteers who are often behind the scenes, but are so important to keeping things moving along and they volunteer on our operating committees, Board of Directors, preparing and delivering meals to the build sites, planning and working our Annual Art Auction and Super Bowl fundraising events and mentoring the families in our home-ownership program. We have so many Volunteers it's hard to list them all.

Because of the generosity of volunteers, along with our business and community partners, and our generous donors, 67 houses were built or recycled by the end of 2015. These houses are home for 67 families, representing 186 family members! Our Habitat affiliate *is* our volunteers and sponsors. Without them, none of the 67 homes would be built and these 186 neighbors in our community very well may not have the decent homes they enjoy today. On behalf of them, THANK YOU for keeping "HUMANITY" in our community.

Values for the economic contributions of volunteers in Arkansas were estimated by multiplying the extrapolated total volunteer hours by Independent Sector's 2014 estimates for the value of volunteer time for the state of Arkansas, currently \$19.14/hour, and the national rate is estimated at \$23.56². Economic estimates could not be calculated for counties for which no organizations reported volunteer hours.




Figure 3: Number of Hours Volunteered Per Capita by County

WHAT VOLUNTEERS DO: DHS VOLUNTEER ACTIVITIES COUNCIL

DHS VAC – encouraging the volunteer spirit at work and beyond.

The Department of Human Services (DHS) Volunteer Activities Council (VAC) may be the only one of its kind in Arkansas state government. The Council is composed of DHS employees, representing most of the 14 divisions and support offices at DHS central office in Little Rock. There are approximately 1,200 employees at the DHS Donaghey Complex.

The Council was created by the Arkansas Office of Volunteerism, the predecessor to the DHS Division of Community Service and Nonprofit Support. The Arkansas Office of Volunteerism had its origins in the Arkansas Governor's Office and joined the Department of Human Services in 1983.

The mission of the Arkansas Office of Volunteerism was to encourage volunteerism as a means of community/state problem solving. It seemed only fitting to promote volunteerism among the employees of its own department. VAC was created to do that by sharing information with DHS employees about local volunteer and service opportunities and sponsoring activities in the workplace that let employees volunteer right at their office. The idea behind VAC is to show employees that volunteering doesn't have to be complicated or difficult and that there are opportunities to volunteer everywhere.

Since it began more than 30 years ago, VAC members have met monthly to come up with ideas and ways to continually engage DHS employees to volunteer in projects at work and to encourage them to volunteer in their own communities.

The DHS VAC has sponsored Red Cross Blood Drives each year at DHS for more than 20 years. Each year, employees donate as much as 200 pints of blood which in turn helps hundreds of people who need blood.

The Council also serves as the contact for Department's participation in the Little Rock School District's Partners in Education program. For example, DHS has been paired with Bale Elementary School for nearly 20 years. As a partner to the school, DHS employees support Bale students and their families throughout the school year through mentoring and reading programs, food and clothing drives for Bale students and their families and by attending special activities for students. DHS employees have also participated in the KTHV Summer Cereal Drive at work for the last 13 years; last year, DHS collected more than 3,500 boxes of cereal. In addition, VAC shares information about after-hours volunteer opportunities with employees such as working at a local food bank, serving as volunteers for the City of Little Rock's annual Riverfest and assisting at other local non-profits. Other projects the Council has supported over the years include the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure, the American Heart Association Heart Walk, United Way, the March of Dimes Walk, Make a Difference Day and Paint Your Heart Out.

Each year, the Council holds a volunteer recognition event in September during Arkansas Volunteer Month to thank employees for their volunteer support of projects sponsored by VAC.


