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<p>1 PROCEEDINGS</p> <p>2 I. WELCOME</p> <p>3 MS. RUSS: So I have 1:30. We will go ahead</p> <p>4 and get started. I just gave instructions across</p> <p>5 the hall. So welcome to today's Child Welfare</p> <p>6 Agency Review Board meeting. Today is August</p> <p>7 31st. And we do want to welcome our new Attorney</p> <p>8 General -- Assistant Attorney General, Sarah</p> <p>9 Farris. She is taking over for Joe West. And</p> <p>10 feel free to say something if you want.</p> <p>11 MS. FARRIS: Well, I'm very happy to be</p> <p>12 here. When I attended the last meeting, I really</p> <p>13 -- I felt drawn to this Board and what it does,</p> <p>14 and I think it's so important. So I kind of</p> <p>15 lobbied for this. I also represent the Health</p> <p>16 Service Permit Commission which as you know</p> <p>17 issues POAs to PRTFs and other facilities. So</p> <p>18 there is crossover. So I'm just very happy to be</p> <p>19 here and to be representing you guys.</p> <p>20 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: We're glad to have you.</p> <p>21 MS. FARRIS: Thank you.</p> <p>22 MS. RUSS: And I will say if you need for us</p> <p>23 to talk louder, just let us know. Okay? Okay.</p> <p>24 You can go ahead.</p> <p>25 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: All right.</p> <p>Page 3</p>	<p>1 on your -- your place.</p> <p>2 MS. AARON: Good afternoon, I'm Christie</p> <p>3 Aaron, HR Director with Millcreek and I am here</p> <p>4 requesting a special permission to work for Mr.</p> <p>5 Frederick P. He has presented to us to work with</p> <p>6 one of our little boys' units. He is an early</p> <p>7 childhood education major at UAPB. He is very</p> <p>8 active in sports medicine training and all that</p> <p>9 and so it is our hope that this Board will grant</p> <p>10 us a special permission for him.</p> <p>11 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: It will take us just a few</p> <p>12 minutes to read over this because we have -- we</p> <p>13 don't get these in advance, so it -- the silence</p> <p>14 is nothing to read into other than we're just</p> <p>15 reading it.</p> <p>16 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.</p> <p>17 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: Does the Board have any</p> <p>18 questions?</p> <p>19 MR. TOLLETTE: If understand, Mr. Chair --</p> <p>20 and I apologize to the Board for being late.</p> <p>21 I'll pay my penalty later. Yes. It's been a</p> <p>22 year -- is Mr. Pierce here?</p> <p>23 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.</p> <p>24 MR. TOLLETTE: Okay. All right. Can you</p> <p>25 stand up young man?</p> <p>Page 5</p>

1 MR. FREDERICK P.: I want to get a look at
2 you. Do you have a temper?
3 MR. FREDERICK P.: No, sir.
4 MR. TOLLETTE: You don't?
5 MR. FREDERICK P.: No, sir.
6 MR. FREDERICK P.: I am the most calmest
7 individual that you will ever meet.
8 MR. TOLLETTE: Really?
9 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.
10 MR. TOLLETTE: Something here says you're
11 not.
12 MR. FREDERICK P.: And would you like me to
13 talk about that?
14 MR. TOLLETTE: Whether the Board wants to
15 hear it or not, I don't know. I just -- to make
16 a decision, I just got to be me.
17 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.
18 MR. TOLLETTE: All right. Do you come from
19 a big family?
20 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.
21 MR. TOLLETTE: Lots of brothers and sisters?
22 MR. FREDERICK P.: On my mother's side, I
23 have a older brother and a older sister. And on
24 my dad's side, I have an older brother and four
25 other sisters.

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1 MR. TOLLETTE: So what I'm doing is I'm just
2 trying to make a quick snapshot of your family
3 constellation for me.
4 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.
5 MR. TOLLETTE: Okay. And so you're the
6 calmest, nicest, wonderful person, but this says
7 something different. Okay?
8 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.
9 MR. TOLLETTE: So at this point, thank you,
10 Mr. Chair. That's all I have.
11 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: Okay.
12 MR. HEIMER: If I may, Mr. Pierce.
13 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.
14 MR. HEIMER: Hey, my name is Justin. How
15 are you sir?
16 MR. FREDERICK P.: I'm great. How are you
17 doing?
18 MR. HEIMER: I'm doing good. Thanks for
19 coming in here today.
20 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.
21 MR. HEIMER: So I'm trying to make sense of
22 this here. So it looks like you had a bad day a
23 year ago where you got arrested. I read your
24 letter discussing that. You are -- I'm sorry. I
25 don't know if you were arrested. You had -- you

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1 had a -- you got pulled over and some stuff. You
2 wrote in your letter if I read it correctly, that
3 you're certain you didn't have -- that your
4 license wasn't suspended?
5 MR. FREDERICK P.: I was positive that my
6 license wasn't suspended because I went to a DMV
7 and got a reinstatement letter.
8 MR. HEIMER: Okay. Did you plead guilty to
9 the --
10 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes.
11 MR. HEIMER: -- to the --
12 MR. FREDERICK P.: I went ahead and just
13 pleaded guilty to it.
14 MR. HEIMER: Okay.
15 MR. FREDERICK P.: They depicted me out to
16 bad guy because, originally, what happened -- I
17 was at work. I worked at Walmart in Sheridan,
18 Arkansas.
19 MR. HEIMER: Uh-huh.
20 MR. FREDERICK P.: It was my first day. It
21 was orientation and I went in, like -- you know,
22 they just went ahead and put me on the clock. It
23 was my break time. We had an hour lunch. I went
24 to my lunch. Tried to get me a snack. Went and
25 sat in Walmart's parking lot. The sun was

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1 beaming down on my car. It got so hot; my car
2 wouldn't stay cool. So I was looking for a
3 little shady park I could sit in, you know, eat
4 my lunch. In the process of me going to go get
5 my, you know, get everything together to go sit
6 down to eat, I was pulled over by a Sheridan
7 police officer. And he came and he was like, "I
8 see you were speeding," but the road that -- if
9 you would have seen the road that he says I was
10 speeding on, you would not believe that I was
11 speeding. So that's problem No. 1.
12 He ended up asking for my license and
13 registration. I handed him everything with no
14 issues. I was compliant. I gave him everything
15 that he wanted me to. He came back and says,
16 "Oh, your license is suspended." I had a notice
17 from DMV that was just, like, okay, you can go to
18 work only and that's it. And I got my
19 reinstatement stuff also. He said, "The license
20 was --
21 MR. HEIMER: Can I -- can I interrupt you
22 for a second?
23 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir.
24 MR. HEIMER: Why was your license suspended
25 at some point?

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<p>1 MR. FREDERICK P.: For a speeding ticket 2 that I just forgot to pay. 3 MR. HEIMER: Okay. 4 MR. FREDERICK P.: Went to court for it. 5 MR. HEIMER: Sure. 6 MR. FREDERICK P.: Got to college and just 7 forgot to pay it. 8 MR. HEIMER: I understand. 9 MR. FREDERICK P.: Yes, sir. He -- he 10 eventually was like -- he came back and was like, 11 "Your license is suspended." I said, "It can't 12 be" and I showed him the paperwork. And he was 13 like, "Well, in our systems, they still say 14 suspended. So can you step out of the vehicle?" 15 I asked him why. And I did exactly like this. 16 "Why do I need to step out of the vehicle?" And 17 that's when he pulled his Taser out on me. So at 18 that point, you know, in the heat of the climate 19 that we were living in at that time, I didn't 20 want to be another -- as I say another hashtag. 21 I didn't want -- I didn't want no issues. I 22 didn't want to get hurt. 23 So he reaches into my car, pulls me out by 24 force, and -- he pulls me out the car by force 25 and eventually was just like, "Put your hands</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 10</p>	<p>1 kindest, most sweetest, most generous person 2 there ever could be. And I'm not that type of 3 person. That ticket -- that incident right there 4 should not depict who I am as a person. 5 In my freshman year of college back in 2019, 6 I volunteered at Klassic Kidz in Pine Bluff, 7 Arkansas. I was also a teacher's aide at James 8 Matthews Elementary in Dollorway, Arkansas. 9 Working there in Millcreek I met some really -- I 10 met some really crazy kids, but I fell in love 11 with them. I love the kids to death, especially 12 in at Rock Hill. I made a couple -- I made a lot 13 of bonds. Every time they greeted me it was 14 always, "Hey, Mr. Pierce" or as my alias goes, 15 "Hello, Mr. Warren, how are you doing today?" I 16 just -- I'm not a bad person. And I shouldn't -- 17 I feel like that ticket shouldn't depict me as 18 this type of person. I'm a calm individual. I 19 talk with confidence. I'm kind of nervous right 20 now, but -- 21 MR. HEIMER: You're doing great. 22 MR. FREDERICK P.: -- I'm myself and that's 23 all I can't be the end of the day. 24 MR. HEIMER: Thank you, sir. 25 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: Any other questions?</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 12</p>
<p>1 behind your back." He threw my hands behind my 2 back and started like manhandling me. So at that 3 point, I was like, "Hey, you hurting me." And he 4 threw me on my car and said, "Stop resisting 5 arrest." And I told him I wasn't resisting. 6 I was thrown in the back of a police car. 7 Asked him could he turn the air on, he told me 8 no. It was like 90 degrees outside. I'm in the 9 back of a police car in handcuffs, sweating 10 bullets, so you can only you can only -- you can 11 obviously imagine how fearful I was for my life. 12 I ended up going down to the police department. 13 The police officer kept making smart remarks 14 about my -- about my personality and my temper -- 15 supposedly to my temper. WHATLEY: I have one more question for 2 you specifically, but I understand that you're -- 3 maintain that you're a very calm individual, have 4 a personality that gets along with people and all 5 of that. This particular day as far as, like, on 6 what happened then, was there anything -- any 7 time -- any point that you would say that you got 8 angry and that you tried to pull away from the 9 officer or -- 10 MR. FREDERICK P.: No, sir. I never one 11 time tried to pull away from the officer. If 12 anything, he made me feel like that I was -- he 13 made me feel like if -- I was afraid. As you can 14 see, I'm a very timid, small, young man versus 15 this big, tall officer -- bald-headed guy -- and 16 he just made me feel like I was less of a person. 17 MR. WHATLEY: Okay. Thank you. 18 MR. TOLLETTE: Let me tell you. You're 19 hitting me hard right now and I have got to watch 20 what I have got to say. But 4 if you express that manhood, you get chopped. 5 And then you get picked at to be antagonized and 6 to be set up. So -- am I right, Mr. Chairman, 7 this is not recommended by staff at this point, 8 because it's too soon?</p> <p>9 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: PRLU does not support this 10 request because I think it's, primarily, just 11 because it's so recent; is that correct?</p> <p>12 MS. RUSS: That's correct.</p> <p>13 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: It's not -- it's not the 14 offense itself, it's just -- but in the past, I 15 think typically, this Board has kind of looked at 16 -- looked more favorably on issues that were in 17 -- many years in the past and there's -- there's 18 been a record of not any other --</p> <p>19 MR. 21 MR. WHATLEY: I'll second that.

11 -- " after nonoperation for one year, it applies
12 to all licenses.
13 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: All licenses?
14 MS. FARRIS: All of them.
15 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: Even though the Act
16 specifically states PRTFs?
17 MS. FARRIS: Well, it doesn't actually. It
18 says, "The Board shall terminate the license of a
19 licensee that has not been in operation for a
20 consecutive 12-month period."
21 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: In context though, is that
22 not -- I think that was our question. You're
23 saying that it's any --
24 MS. FARRIS: Yeah. Any licensee.
25 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: Okay.

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1 MS. FARRIS: So to the extent that that
2 hasn't happened, if there's been an extension
3 that shouldn't have been granted, the Board may
4 want to consider revisiting that.
5 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: There's been extensions?
6 MS. RUSS: No. I don't think so.
7 CHAIRMAN ALTOM: Okay.
8 MS. RUSS: I do have a question about it.
9 So okay, if we terminate a license and by the
10 next month, so would they have to apply for
11 another -- like get another application going or,
12 like, what is -- what does that process look like
13 to -- if they want to reopen or have it licensed
14 again?
15 MS. DOHERTY: I would think so. Wouldn't
16 they have to --
17 MR. HEIMER: Start over.
18 MS. DOHERTY: -- reapply?
19 MS. RUSS: Reapply?
20 MS. FARRIS: I would think so. We'd really
21 need to talk to Michelle about that.
22 MR. HEIMER: Is there a definition of in
23 operation?
24 MS. JEFFREY: Been inactive for a year,
25 correct? Let me get my book in here with me.

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1 MS. FARRIS: Uh-huh.
2 MS. JEFFREY: And then after a year, same
3 thing with childcare, if you become inactive for
4 a year --
5 MS. FARRIS: Uh-huh.
6 MS. JEFFREY: -- and then after a year, you
7 have to do something. And with this, you just
8 close.
9 MS. FARRIS: Yeah. I mean if they haven't
10 been in operation for a consecutive 12-month
11 period then --
12 MR. WHATLEY: Just --
13 MS. FARRIS: -- you have to --
14 MR. WHATLEY: as a refresher though. Part
15 of the question on this -- people who have
16 multiple licenses. And so just an example,
17 someone that holds a residential license also
18 holds transitional living license, emergency
19 license, childcare placement. And there could be
20 times for example in one like on transitional
21 living in our facility. Because of the ages of
22 the children, there could be a 12-month, 18-month
23 period that no one is in our transitional home
24 but we're still needing it. But the age of the
25 population of our kids has not warranted the use
