National Preparedness Month

2022 Theme: A Lasting Legacy

The life you've built is worth protecting. Prepare for disasters to create a lasting legacy for you and your family.



National Preparedness Month is an observance each September to raise awareness about the importance of preparing for disasters and emergencies that could happen at any time.

In 2021, FEMA's Ready Campaign and the Ad Council broke ground by producing the first-ever national preparedness campaign specifically targeting the Latino community for National Preparedness Month. Released during Hispanic Heritage month, the advertisements centered around the Latino community's commitment to personal planning for occasions and family milestones as a bridge to also planning for disasters.

This one-of-a-kind campaign is committed to putting people first and reaching communities where they are. To continue these efforts, this year's National Preparedness Month campaign will feature a call to action for the Black and African American community.

Tips for people with disabilities to think about personal disaster preparedness.

- ♦ Stay informed, make a plan, build a kit, get involved.
- ♦ Consider items you use daily as well as life-sustaining items.
- ♦ Those who use a wheelchair, add spare tires and an air compressor to your emergency kit to make sure you can stay mobile in the event of an emergency.
- ♦ For electronic devices used to communicate, charge and keep back-up batteries in your emergency kit so you can converse with emergency responders and stay mobile.
- ♦ Create a network of people who can help you in a disaster. Keep; a contact list in a watertight container in your emergency kit or on your electronic devices.
- Ask your power provider to put you on a list for priority power restoration.

Remembering 9/11 21 years later



Never Forget: Visit Our National Memorials Honoring 9/11

On September 11, 2001, nearly 3,000 people perished during the single largest terrorist attack in American history. More than twenty years later, millions of Americans still remember the events of that day. You can honor those who died by taking a journey to one of the three September 11 national memorials.

The National 9/11 Pentagon Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Dedicated on September 11, 2008, the National 9/11 Pentagon Memorial is a beautiful open space shaded by 85 crape myrtle trees. The memorial contains 184 memorial units: benches surrounded by a lit water pool, each engraved with the name of a deceased service member or civilian. These benches honor all those who died at the Pentagon during the attack, including passengers on American Airlines Flight 77, which terrorists hijacked and crashed into the building.

The 9/11 Memorial & Museum in New York City

The 9/11 Memorial & Museum are two connected sites of remembrance and education, honoring those who perished at the World Trade Center in both the skyscrapers, in the Pentagon, on United Airlines Flight 175 and on American Airlines Flight 11 and Flight 77.

The Flight 93 National Memorial in Shanksville, Pennsylvania

The Flight 93 National Memorial is the third such site dedicated to the events of September 11, 2001. It is located near the crash site of United Airlines Flight 93 in Stonycreek Township, Somerset County, Pennsylvania. The nearest town to the crash site is Shanksville. There, the passengers and crew wrestled control away from their terrorist hijackers, purposefully crashing the plane to prevent another attack, saving lives and thwarting an attack on the U.S. Capitol. The memorial is about two miles north of Shanksville and 60 miles southeast of Pittsburgh.


