Attending the Special Olympics World Games in Berlin was a dream come true. There were 7,000 Special Olympics athletes and Unified partners from approximately 190 countries competing in 26 sports. In addition, there were also more than 3,000 coaches and 20,000 volunteers. This year, we had two athletes from Arkansas attend their first World Games: Amy Price from Van Buren and Josh Warner from Fayetteville. They proudly represented Arkansas and received seven total medals and ribbons. Amy competed in three track and field events, finishing with a silver in the 3000m run, an 8th place finish in the 1500m run and a 6th place finish in the 4x100 m relay. Josh competed in four power lifting events and finished with a gold on the bench press and silvers in the squat, deadlift, and triple combination.

I served as assistant coach for our Special Olympics USA swim team of eight swimmers. Our swimmers were from eight states and competed in events ranging from the 25m backstroke to the 1500m open water freestyle. Overall, the swim team finished with six individual medals (2 gold, 4 silver), one medal for the team relay (silver), and eight ribbons (two 4th, two 5th, three 6th, and one 8th).

Not only did our team become a family, but we made new friends from all over the world. Special Olympics at the world level gave me the opportunity to feel true inclusion and experience the magnitude of love for these athletes. While we know support is available throughout our communities, it was a global experience this time which magnifies the work that Eunice Shriver began, and that impact was visible in so many lives. Nothing could top the cheers of support from other countries during each event. It was a great honor and the highest privilege to be part of the Special Olympics USA Team.
