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DYS FY 2017 Fourth Quarter Statistics – Summary

Total Commitments for Fourth Quarter FY 2014-2016

2017 = 121 2016-122 2015 = 171

Commitments by Offense (Figure 1)

Felony = 66% Misdemeanor 34%





Figure 2: First Commitments vs. Recommits April – June 2017

First Commitments vs. Recommits (Figure 2)

First Commits = 83% Recommits = 17%

Violent vs. Non-Violent Offenses (Figure 3)

Violent offenses = 13% Non-violent offenses = 87%





Figure 4: Commitments by Age, Gender, and Race





Figure 6: Commitments by Race April – June 2017

Commitments by Age, Gender, Race (Figure 4, 5, 6)

Total commitments, gender: 91% male, 9% female AR youth population, gender: 51% male, 49% female Total commitments, race: 48% African American, 47% white, 10% other AR youth population, race: 20% African American, 77% white, 3% other Ages of committed youth: 11-18 years Over half of total commitments were between 16-17 years

Figure 1: Commitments by Offense April – June 2017

Figure 3: Violent vs. Non-Violent Offenses April – June 2017

Figure 5: Commitments by Age and Gender April – June 2017






Figure 8: Commitments by District April – June 2017

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Figure 9: Commitments by District by Year (cont.) April – June 2017






Figure 10: Total Commitments for Quarter with Reference to Previous Years April – June 2017





Figure 12: Youth Served by Community-Based Provider (CBP) Services April – June 2017
